Big Brothers Big Sisters' programs and services are solely focused on the vulnerable sector, children and youth. The one-to-one match program focuses on fostering growth and development in four areas: physical, intellectual, emotional, and social/cultural.</p> <p>Through a one-to-one friendship, a screened and trained Big Brother/Sister volunteer offers support, encouragement, and inspiration. Big Brothers and Big Sisters listen, encourage, and teach through sharing fun experiences.  <p>* <i>New</i> Choices for Change</p>	<p>Crossing Bridges is a youth outreach program that <i>Choices for Change</i> operates in Listowel.</p> <p>Crossing Bridges is a drop in centre for high risk youth that provides a safe, substance free environment where youth can receive support with their mental health and/or substance use, be connected to community resources, access food and computers for housing and job searches, become involved in substance free, healthy activities and set and work towards personal goals. The program is offered 5 days per week from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Most youth who access this program have been involved with the Children's Aid Society and a variety of other social service agencies for a number of years and are enrolled in COPE, the alternative school for youth unable to participate in the regular school system.</p> <p>Crossing Bridges offers a safe environment, where youth can get their needs met without the pressure of having to 'tell their story' in order to get service. These youths often need time to build trust with service providers and Crossing Bridges allows this. The youth are anonymous, there is no intake process, they only have to show up. Child Witness Program: This program provides an in-house program for children in Perth County who have witnessed and experienced domestic violence. The program runs once per week for group work with the children and an hour a week for per child for individual sessions with children who have been enrolled in the program. The program covers topics like dealing with anger, healthy relationships, witnessing abuse and self-esteem. The program will also provide services to women and children in the *Emily Murphy* care that produce positive and long lasting outcomes in the long term. Groups and Individual counseling across the County will be offered as well as training to staff and managers around trauma informed care and the effects that witnessing abuse has on children.

Huron County Food Bank Distribution Centre

HCFBDC sources small and large shipments of food from farmers and companies. Quantities of food are divided into more manageable orders and distributed to local food banks and aid agencies. Since 2009 HCFBDC has distributed more than 1.5 million pounds of food to 66 different clients through ongoing deliveries. These clients support hungry families in their communities every day and the numbers are increasing on a yearly basis. Each \$10,000 donation will buy a tractor trailer load of food for distribution.

UWPH funds the **Neighbours Helping Neighbours Program a program that enables HCFBDC to provide food banks with their increasing food security needs.**

 <p>*New Huron County Health Unit</p>	<p>Poverty to Prosperity (P2P) Program The key activity of this program is to develop a Working Group of service providers and women in the isolated communities to improve service coordination. A half-time coordinator will work for the group as they define the strengths, assets and gaps in community services. We anticipate that service providers will be prepared to review their programs and policies and collaborate to improve delivery. Activities for women may include workshops, information sessions, peer coaching, and meetings on topics such as food security, economic options such as co-operatives and self-employment, further education, community development, volunteerism, establishing self-help groups, fund-raising, arts, culture and recreation activities, financial literacy, and household management.</p> <p>This project will serve as a conduit for integrating lived experience into service coordination in Huron County, social program effectiveness, long-term P2P poverty reduction strategies and improved service provision. Through the activities determined by the women in the community, it will also generate opportunities for community engagement, meaningful participation and empowerment for women, their families and communities. The anticipated outcome is "community services working together, making it easier to navigate the system".</p> <p>Prosperity outcomes tend to be seen as financial.  <p>Huron Safe Homes for Youth</p>	<p>Huron Safe Homes for Youth recognizes that adolescence is a period of transition where youth and their families face many challenges. The purpose of the Agency is to respond to crisis and emergency situations involving young people and their families/caregivers in an attempt (where possible) to restore the family unit.</p> <p>The Agency is funded by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services to provide short-term crisis oriented support services. Responding to crisis/emergency situations often requires more than a 'Band-Aid' solution. The Extended Care Program enables the Agency to work more intensely with 25 young people over an extended period of time. The John Howard Society of London and District provides counselling, advocacy and discharge planning to persons who are incarcerated in the Stratford Jail and information, counselling, and emotional support to their family members. The Society also assists individuals upon release from custody in their reintegration to the family unit and the community.  <p>Local community Food Centre</p>	<p>The Storehouse at The Local Community Food Centre is a food distribution hub that has been set up in Stratford via a partnership between The United Way of Perth Huron and Community Food Centres Canada. Its purpose is to connect not-for-profit food programs such as food banks, community meals, student nutrition programs, and other organizations like shelters and group homes, with increased access to donated and strategically purchased healthy food. Most of these organizations have been unable to connect their community members with fresh produce or unprocessed ingredients due to a lack of capacity. Large scale donations from food industry were missed out on because of a lack of a storage and handling space. The Storehouse includes a 250+ square foot walk-in cooler and 250+ square foot walk-in freezer so that donations of perishable food from industry and agriculture can be safely brought in, stored and distributed out to these organizations. Healthy nonperishable food is also accepted in large scale donations. ONE CARE's Transportation services **EasyRide**, is a Community Support Service offered to seniors, including frail elderly and persons with disabilities in Huron and Perth Counties. EasyRide provides transportation for medical appointments, treatments and hospital discharge (in and out-of-town), adult day programs, grocery shopping, errands and social activities. This service is based on individual needs and provided to those who can transfer independently and those with mobility limitations. ONE CARE has 150 screened, trained volunteer drivers who use their own vehicles. In addition, there are 14 agency operated wheelchair accessible vehicles, three passenger vans and coordinated taxi service.

Client fees apply for Transportation. This service assists individuals with support in daily living, helping them to live independently in the community, which may support their health and avoid early admittance to long-term care.

Solutions

PF Solutions (PF) is a **practice first program** where individuals facing multiple barriers to employment attend over a period of time to upgrade their skills and gain work experience, increasing their employability. Employers require staff that know work expectations and turn up every day. They need to see an applicant has done the job before – so they can be confident that they can do it again.

Barriers to employment include having never worked, absence from the work force, transitioning because of health challenges, new graduates (youth & second career), new to Canada, disabilities, lack of confidence/self-esteem and skill gaps.

Helping participants that face these barriers is an individual process, one that requires daily mentoring, structure, guidance, motivation and encouragement and allows the participant to work at his/her own pace. Individuals can't be helped by a cookie cutter program, or thrown into the workplace to immediately fail – the approach needs to be customized, versatile, and flexible while offering the structure and guidance needed. The more confident a person is in their own ability, the more apt they are at succeeding in the workforce.

PF currently helps between 30-36 participants a year to gain employment, this includes 6-8 OW recipients.

Community Trends Platform: This program supports a platform of data within our community and others that offers tangible evidence of resident and economic well-being, understanding of the current quality of life we enjoy, and the emerging needs and gaps in community services.

The Community Trends platform is an online indicator system that identifies and tracks relevant data that speak to a community's well-being that will be available to all members of the community. These community indicators provide information on the overall direction of a community, providing data on where it is improving, declining, and/ or staying the same.

Youth Centre: To provide a positive, supportive, safe environment for youth of St. Marys and area to be able to socialize, hang out and participate offering a sense of community spirit. We offer two programs for youth in grades 4 - 8, drop-in programs and registered structured programs. We offer a variety of programs to youth some are free and some have a small cost (for children that cannot afford it we cover any costs). Programs include Yoga, youth dances, dodge ball, Hang-time drop in programs, Snack Attack (cooking), home alone classes for children, free breakfast program, ball hockey, scooter camps and splash and kick (swimming and a movie night). The GOALS breakfast program has grown to 65 children/youth each and every week coming out for a 'free' breakfast program before school.

Shelterlink

Living Options for Youth (LOFY) has been in operation since 2004 and offers an opportunity for at-risk youth to find safety and stability in their lives. At LOFY, youth have access to a shared kitchen, lounge and laundry room, while living in a private bedroom. Weekly cleaning of the residence and sheet-change is provided by SGH Residence janitorial staff.

Food is provided to the youth of LOFY through the donation of leftover SGH cafeteria food daily, daily donations from Coffee Culture and from the Local Community Food Centre. Once in LOFY, youth participate in important Life Skills training, are assisted with short and long-term goal development, and are offered access to resources they may need.

Emergency Community Placement offers immediate, same-day assistance to youth in a housing crisis. Youth between the ages of 16-24 without a place to sleep that night, qualify for the program. An assessment is done by the Case Manager to learn why the youth needs assistance. If the youth calls after hours or on weekends, then LOFY staff handle the assessment over the phone and arrange for the youth to meet with the Case Manager on the next day. Stratford's local motels have Emergency kits that include hygiene supplies, grocery cards and contact numbers.

Having met with the Case Manager, a housing plan, community referrals, assistance with social services, school, and employment opportunity actions are taken. This is a partnership with City of Stratford Social Services.

Membership Assistance: Provides support for those who are lower earners, marginalized or in transition to be able to afford healthy activities. Many in our community cannot access activities due to inability to pay. In 2015 over 1600 people of all ages were supported to participate in programs they could not otherwise afford to pay for. There are a number of barriers that prevent people from their involvement in physical activity and we try to take down as many of those as we can. For membership assistance, we enable anyone who wants to participate in our programs to do so. Our programs include: swim lessons, fitness classes, crafts programs, gymnastics, etc. We take the financial burden away, we help to have families' car pool, we have extra bathing suits and towels, running shoes, etc., if families are unable to afford these. A Y membership is the same for anyone, whether they are paying full fee or not. The YMCA is open to all.

Huron County Recreation, Arts & Sports Program: This program was initiated to provide financial assistance for children and youth from families whom are recipients of Social Assistance, in order to participate in recreation, arts and sports programs. Each child/youth may receive up to \$500.00 annually, which can be put towards reducing barriers that results from registration costs, equipment needs and transportation barriers associated with a desired activity.

This program is being transitioned from being only offered to families referred through County Social Services to an open self-referral process, making it accessible to families living with a total income of less than \$45,000. Once a family applies, the coordinator of the program works with the family to identify child interests and matches them to an appropriate program.
