Housing is unaffordable for many households in Perth-Huron





Unfortunately, many households pay more than the recommended 30% of their income on housing, because local housing costs have risen dramatically.

We estimate that 1 in 4 households in Perth and Huron couldn't afford a one-bedroom at 2023 asking rents.









Rents are too high for single-earner households and for workers in hospitality, retail, and manufacturing. A single individual working at posted hospitality/retail wages would spend 52% of their income on rent.

Many individuals who can't work depend on social assistance benefits like Ontario Works (OW) and the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP). Households relying on these programs would have to spend between 52% and 160% of their monthly income to pay asking rents.

Community housing is run by governments or non-profits and includes rent-geared-to-income housing, co-op housing, and 'affordable/attainable' housing offered at a discount. It aims to serve low-to-moderate-income households.
